Let's Talk Chicken!

Here's a quirky, fun thing you might not know about Albuquerque: Zoning laws allow you to have livestock in your backyard. Now, it may be wiser to skip the cows and pigs and consider chickens, which can be less work and less smell intensive.

Yes, chickens are relatively easy to keep, entertaining to watch, and help you make the best Huevos Rancheros ever. If your neighbors are skeptical, you could win them over with a gift of fresh delicious eggs. Chances are they will enjoy having chickens as neighbors.

So, how can you actually turn your backyard into a chicken habitat? Luckily, there are lots of chicken lovers around that will happily talk chicken with you and answer your questions. There are many great websites offering loads of information.

You can find a local chicken blog at dukecityfix.com/group/abqurbanchickens. A top favorite website is backyardchickens.com. They offer a wealth of information on how to set up and maintain your flock, and give tons of ideas on how to build a coop or upcycle one. Best part is they post lots of pictures!

In spring local feed stores sell locally raised chicks along with all the supplies you need. There are local poultry swaps all spring and summer, and chances are someone knows chickens at every grower's market in town. Also check out Wilber's Farm in Belen for chicks, info and supplies. Many urban chicken keepers are willing to give tours if you just ask nicely.

Here's some chicken facts to help you get crackin:

- Fifteen hens is the maximum number of chickens allowed in Albuquerque. You can have one rooster, if you dare.
- No special permit is required.
- You do not need a rooster to get great eggs and have happy girls.
- A hen lays an egg every 1-3 days. She will lay less in winter, or when it is extremely hot.

- Most hens begin laying at 5 to 6 months of age.
- Hens lay best between 1-3 years of age, but will usually continue to lay, just less regularly, all their lives.
- Each chicken needs about 10 square feet of space to remain happy.
- Most breeds of chickens do fine in Albuquerque winters as long as they protected from wind where they sleep.
- In hot weather, chickens must have shade. Always be kind to your girls.
- Chickens usually live 6-8 years if kept healthy, but can live much longer.
- Chickens are great composters. They will eat all kinds of fruit and vegetables, they love kitchen scraps except for citrus and onions.

One thing to keep in mind is chickens poop a lot! They require a good poop management plan. Aged chicken poop is great fertilizer, but you'll need a place to keep it for several months while it is aging. If you're a gardener, chicken poop can be your buddy.

Super Apricots!

Back in season and bright as can be, these sweet fruits are plentiful and so delicious! Not just yummy and easy to prepare, apricots are so good for you.

Apricots have some unlikely cousins in their botanical family of drupes, including almonds, raspberries, olives, coffee and mangoes. Apricots' closer relatives are cherries and plums, all known for their single, hard pits.

Royal Blenheims are the apricot of choice around these parts--fragrant, juicy, or downright beautiful. Apricots growing in the sun's direct gaze are marked with freckles and a rosy blush, but even pale, somewhat firm fruit can be perfectly ripe since these are the only stone fruit to ripen from the inside out.

In the center of the pit of each apricot is a kernel. It's these kernels, rather than almonds, from which almond extract is made. Throughout apricot

season, save the pits in the freezer. Later, crack the shells with a hammer, remove the kernels, and roast them in the oven. Steep the kernels in vodka to make an almond flavored extract.

Apricots are delicious fresh, but there are many ways to prepare and preserve them. You can use them in pies, tarts, crisps, or to create sauces especially wonderful with fish. You can roast apricots sprinkled with brown sugar and drizzled in sweet wine, or put apricots on skewers with other fruit such as pineapple, brush with honey and grill them. Put apricots in the blender to make yummy juice or smoothies. Even try adding apricots to homemade salsa.

Here's an easy recipe for Apricot Crumble:

For the crumble topping:

- 3/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 3/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. ground cinnamon
- 8 Tbs. (1 stick) butter, room temperature, cut into chunks

For the bottom layer:

- 5 cups pitted apricots, cut into chunks
- 2 tsp. fresh lemon juice
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla extract
- · 2 Tbs. flour
- 1/3 cup sugar

Directions:

Preheat oven to 400°F.

Butter a 9" pie dish, or 9" x 7" baking dish.

Topping: Stir together flour, brown sugar, salt and cinnamon. Cut in butter and mix until butter is evenly distributed and it clumps.

Fruit layer: In another bowl, stir together apricots, lemon juice and vanilla. Add flour and sugar. Stir to coat fruit evenly. Transfer to prepared baking dish and sprinkle topping evenly over the surface. Bake until fruit is bubbling and topping is golden, about 40 minutes. Serve warm. Great with ice cream. Serves 6-8 to 8.

One last note: An easy way to harvest apricots is to secure bird netting underneath the bottom branches, then just give the branches a little shake. Voila! The apricots fall off and collect in the netting.
